



Craig has taught in the Department of Communication since 1992, sharing a wealth of experience from his remarkable career spanning over 55 years in journalism. A four-time Emmy Award winner, Craig worked as a network correspondent and reporter in major markets like New York and Los Angeles, and became a beloved voice in Utah television with his signature features and historical storytelling. He's taught up to 11 classes a year, inspired countless students, and produced documentaries that sparked meaningful social change.
